


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
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

# EDINBURGH: NEW & OLD

You are going to explore the best of central Edinburgh today. Start the day in a cute neighborhood of Edinburgh, then walk through New Town, and finally climb the crag to Edinburgh's Old Town. It may feel like a lot to do in one day, but the distances between the stops are short. The history of this fantastic city will enthrall you so that the day will fly by!

Walk halfway up the Royal Mile for a lively Scottish dinner

# **Q STOP 0**

### **PATISSERIE FLORENTIN**

This is an optional stop but a great way to start your day in Edinburgh. Walk, taxi, or bus to the charming **Patisserie**Florentin at the south end of the Stockbridge neighborhood. For breakfast, grab a coffee, espresso, smoothie, pastry, sandwich, or all of the above.

- > Open daily at 8 AM.

The charming cafe, full of local artwork, is half a block from the even more charming Circus Lane. It is lined with cottage houses that run along a cobblestone lane with a church steeple in the background, making for a delightful stroll and photographs.

Alternative: The Pantry, 100 meters from Patisserie Florentin, can provide a heartier meal for this big day in Edinburgh. The walk-in-only breakfast spot offers avocado toast, waffles and bacon, and more. But you'll be ordering the classic Pantry Fry.

# **Q** STOP 1

#### **DEAN VILLAGE**

Located 5 minutes from Princes Street, Dean Village is the off-the-beaten-path place you want to discover. The Water of Leith runs through the ancient village, once home to eleven mills for 800 years. Today, the goal is to walk to the pedestrian bridge on the Water of Leith Walkway.

The bridge is ideal for the iconic view of Dean Bridge, historic buildings along the river, and the Water of Leith walkway. From here, you can walk amongst the charming buildings, like the 1880s Well Court arts and crafts-designed building, and down the Water of Leith Walkway. Explore until you are ready for the next stop!



If you're walking from Patisserie Florentin (Stop 0), you can follow the river upstream to Dean Village. You will pass St. Bernard's Well (1789). Inside is a natural spring thought to have healing powers. This walk under the trees and along the river is our favorite in Edinburgh.

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Just a short walk past Dean Village, you can browse art exhibitions at the <u>Dean Gallery and the Scottish National</u>
<u>Gallery of Modern Art.</u> Both are free to enter, but we recommend walking to Stop 2 to see more of Edinburgh.

# **STOP 2**

#### **PRINCES STREET GARDENS**

A 17-minute walk from Dean Village will take you to Princes Street Gardens. You will walk through New Town and pass by the **Johnnie Walker Experience.** If a morning dram of whisky isn't your liking (they open at 10 AM), voyage down into the gardens. We are all about sitting and savoring when visiting a city. Relax on the grass with locals, see the statues along Princes Street, and go to Ross Fountain for a stellar view of Edinburgh Castle **(directions)**. When the sun is out, this is the place to be in Edinburgh.

Princes Street Gardens are two public parks separated by The Mound, on which the **National Gallery of Scotland** is located. The park is between New Town and Old Town. Nor Loch was a defensive lake (imagine a moat) for Edinburgh Castle, but it was perpetually polluted. In the 1820s, it was drained to make the gardens.

Alternative: The Georgian House is an 18th-century home designed by Robert Adam, the epitome of wealth and class. It is a 5-minute walk north from the Johnnie Walker Experience as you walk towards the Princes Street Gardens in New Town.

The museum is a beautiful example of typical Edinburgh New Town development

from the 18th and 19th centuries. This museum complements Stop 3, an example of a 17th-century Old Town tenement.

# **STOP 3**

#### **GLADSTONE'S LAND**

It's time to head up the crag into Old Town. There are numerous free or inexpensive museums in Old Town. Let me count the reasons why Gladstone's Land was our favorite historical site.

Due to the cramped conditions of Old Town, landlords were forced to build upwards. In the 17th century, Edinburgh was a town of skyscrapers. Standing six stories high (one tenement reached 14 floors!), Gladstone's Land is a perfect example of a high-tenement house. Purchased and refurbished by the National Trust of Scotland, the immersive tour through one of the oldest homes in Edinburgh will give you a glimpse of life in the ancient capital. Let the guides on each floor share the history of the merchants and tenets who lived here for over 500 years. Tickets can be purchased on the ground floor.

#### **ALTERNATIVE MUSEUMS NEARBY:**

THE WRITERS' MUSEUM (free) features the manuscripts and effects of Burns, Scott, and Stevenson in a 1622 house. Walk down Lady Stair's Close next to Gladstone's Land to find the museum.

**MUSEUM ON THE MOUND** (free) traces the history and design of money. Closed Monday and Sunday.

CAMERA OBSCURA & WORLD OF ILLUSION (£22.95) five floors dedicated to illusion and the world's oldest working camera obscura on the roof. Great for a view of the Royal Mile!

**EDINBURGH CASTLE** (£15.50-£195) is at the top of the Royal Mile. We recommended taking half a day to tour the castle, but we want to point it out as you will be right here. Visit during the 1 PM cannon fire.

# **STOP 4**

#### **VICTORIA STREET LUNCH**

Victoria Street is Edinburgh's second most famous street after the Royal Mile. Its funky curves, colorful buildings, view from the public terrace, and Flemishstyle buildings make it picture-perfect. And for those Harry Potter fans, J.K. Rowling wrote Harry Potter in a cafe here. It is the Diagon Alley of Edinburgh.



Grab a drink and a view from the terrace above the street. As you come off the Royal Mile, follow the directions to take you past Tollbooth Kirk and down Upper Bow. This will take you to the top of the terrace or down the steps to Victoria Street.

The street is full of interesting shops, cafes, and restaurants. We recommend grabbing a quick sandwich at Oink Victoria Street. Oink serves up delicious pulled pork sandwiches. Pick your size, stuffing, and sauce. Enjoy!

If you'd prefer a sit-down pub-style lunch, go to **Howies Victoria Street**.

### **Q** STOP 5

#### **ROYAL MILE HIGHLIGHTS**

It is time to stroll the Royal Mile to take in the history, grab some Scottish souvenirs, and enjoy the street performers. Below is a list of our favorite Royal Mile Stops. If you're staying another day in Edinburgh, a **Local Tour Guide** is the best way to get absorbed into Old Town's stories, residents, and history. The list of stops below is in order as you walk down the Royal Mile toward Stop 6. Make sure to get to Stop 6 before the last entry time.

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St. Giles' Cathedral: Admire the 12th-century church from the square or take one of its guided tours at 10:30 AM and 2:30 PM. Self-guided tours are also available. The suggested donation is £6. Home to the Scottish Reformation.

Tron Kirk Market is a makers' market highlighting Scottish artists and craftsmen. It is a welcome relief from the shops along the Royal Mile. Tron Kirk (founded in the 17th century) is one of three ancient Old Town Kirks (churches).

Paisley Close, at first glance, appears unremarkable among Edinburgh's closes. But it has a more fascinating story than most. In 1861, the close was the site of a tragic tenement collapse that killed 35 people. During the attempts to rescue residents from the rubble, one young boy famously shouted, "heave awa' chaps, I'm no' dead yet". The boy's cry for help is recorded in a stone relief above the entrance to the close.

<u>Trunk's Close</u> is Flanked by two of the Royal Mile's oldest buildings, <u>Moubray</u>
<u>House</u> and <u>John Knox House</u>. Walk down

the ancient close to enter a beautiful public garden with a bust of renowned town planner Sir Patrick Geddes.

<u>Dunbar's Close</u> is easy to miss. Go through the archway to a public, 17th-century-style garden. Explore the large garden and enjoy the serenity before the next stop.

### **STOP 6**

#### THE PALACE OF HOLYROODHOUSE

The Palace of Holyroodhouse sits on the ruins of the 1128 founded <u>Holyrood</u> <u>Abbey</u>. Home to the King when he visits Edinburgh, the palace is also famous for its relation to Bonnie Prince Charlie and Mary, Queen of Scots.

Arrive before the last entrance time to give yourself an hour for the self-guided audio tour of the palace.

We recommend **booking tickets in advance** to save a couple of quid. Use the toilets located in the Mews before you enter the palace. Visiting in the late afternoon is the ideal time to skip the crowds. Price: £20 in advance, £22 on the day. Hours: Nov-Mar 9:30 AM to 4:30 PM, Apr-Oct 9:30 AM to 6:00 PM. The last admission is 1.5 hours before closing time.

# **9** STOP 7

# DINNER: WHISKI BAR & RESTAURANT

Make the hike (stroll) back up the Royal Mile to just 100 meters shy of Tron Kirk for a Scottish dinner. Enjoy award-winning haggis, Scottish seafood, Scottish venison, and more. Chase it all down with one of

their 300 Scotch malt whiskies. They have lively Scottish live music every night, but it starts late. See their **music schedule** here.

This is the Old Town dinner and music experience you sought in Edinburgh. You deserve it after this big day of exploring the Capital.

Reservations are optional as they keep walk-in seating available. If it is the busy summer season, booking a table may be wise so you don't have to wait.



Alternative: Tolbooth Tavern is another great option without the walk back up the Royal Mile. Located in an old Tolbooth, the Tolbooth Tavern has been serving drinks and food for over 200 years. Enjoy the pub food and the ample selection of whiskies. Reservations are accepted.

# **OLD TOWN**

#### **MOTEL ONE EDINBURGH-ROYAL\*:**

This property is better than what you would expect from a "motel," but it offers excellent value. With lovely, clean rooms, great service, and an unbeatable location, this is a great place to make your home base on a budget.

**THE SCOTSMAN HOTEL\*:** This hotel is rustic and historic on the outside but sleek and modern on the inside. Complete with a restaurant, bar, and even an in-house cinema, it has everything you need and then some.

**WILDE APARTHOTELS\*:** The comforts of home with the convenience of a hotel. Choose from a studio to a 2-bedroom apartment and enjoy an inviting, laid-back atmosphere.

**THE WITCHERY:** Settled in buildings dating back to the mid-1500s, this upscale gothic hotel sits just before the entrance to Edinburgh Castle. Everything here is 5-star, from the service and food to the ambiance.

THE BALMORAL\*: This luxury hotel exudes elegance where New Town meets Old Town, next to Waverly Train Station. It is home to the landmark clocktower that looks up to Edinburgh Castle and Number One, a Micheline Guide-recognized restaurant.

### **NEW TOWN**

### **IBIS STYLES EDINBURGH ST ANDREW**

**SQUARE\*:** This hotel has several locations. Its New Town hotel has an unassuming exterior that opens up into a colorful and well-decorated interior. The rooms here are on the small side. They have a complimentary continental breakfast in the morning and wonderful staff.

**PREMIER INN:** Several locations around Edinburgh are solid options for a home base. They're reliable, clean, and affordable. We stayed at the Princes Street location and enjoyed it.

**TIGERLILY\*:** This 4-star Georgian hotel has 33 rooms, all thoughtfully decorated and fitted with king-sized beds. The hotel has a restaurant and bar on-site with good food.

ANGEL'S SHARE\*: This is a 4-star hotel that brings you comfort with a side of history. Each of the 31 rooms features an iconic Scot, including actors, musicians, and athletes. This brings a side of culture to your trip that you won't find on a visit to a castle.

KIMPTON CHARLOTTE SQUARE\*: At this 5-star luxury hotel, you'll find a beautiful spa, a fitness center, an indoor pool, and an on-site restaurant, Baba, which wins a spot in our Restaurants section.

APARTMENTS\*: This luxury aparthotel has 50 apartments ranging from studios to 3 bedrooms. It is an excellent option for families and larger groups. The building, a bank until 2007, gives it character, making for a unique stay.

# **STOCKBRIDGE**

THE RAEBURN\*: Built in 1832, this old Georgian family home is now an upscale boutique hotel. This 4-star hotel has just ten rooms, so you'll have an exclusive and peaceful experience. There is a bar, restaurant, and even a library on site.

**NEW TOWN GUEST HOUSE:** Despite the name, this townhouse-turned-hotel is situated in Stockbridge, just outside New Town Edinburgh. It welcomes guests 13 and older.

**7 GLOUCESTER SQUARE\*:** Skip hotels and stay like a local in a vacation rental. This beautiful 3-bedroom stone house is an excellent option for groups of up to 5 who want to stay together.

# **TRANSPORTATION**

Transportation in Edinburgh is simple and affordable. Due to the size of the city center, the best way to get around is with your own two feet. If you're going a little further or have had your fill of walking, hop on a bus, tram, or hail a taxi.

This guide will give you everything you need to know with none of the fluff.

# EDINBURGH WAVERLY TRAIN STATION

Located in the heart of the city center, between New Town and Old Town, the largest train station in Scotland is the main point of entry for those visiting from London or other UK destinations. You will find numerous trains to take you into Edinburgh and trains out to explore more of Scotland. Waverly Station has luggage storage, cafes, shops, and car rental offices are located nearby.



### **EDINBURGH AIRPORT**

Located 30 minutes from the city center, **Edinburgh Airport** (code EDI) is the busiest airport in Scotland and flies to over 150 destinations worldwide. Besides taking a Taxi or Uber to and from the airport, there are convenient and cost-effective transport options.

<u>Airlink</u> is an airport shuttle bus that takes 30 minutes to go to the city center and runs 24/7. A trip costs £5, and a return ticket costs £8.50.

We prefer to take the **Edinburgh Tram** to and from the airport. The tram picks up or drops off on Princes Street and throughout Edinburgh all the way to Leith. Purchase tickets at the platform kiosks before you board. Luggage storage is onboard. The journey takes approximately 35 minutes to New Town and the trams leave every 10 minutes. £7.50 Adult single airport to the city center.

### BUS

Take in the sights from a double-decker bus in this highly connected city. Two companies share bus stops. Expect a single journey to cost about £2 per person (with a cap for Lothian of £4.80/day or £22/week).

Lothian Buses has more than 50 routes that cover all of Edinburgh and some surrounding areas. The bus system is straightforward; you can opt for paper tickets or a contactless card! Tap in on every journey with the same card, and you'll be charged the lowest rate for the trips you take with a daily and weekly maximum.

**First Buses** also allows contactless payments but does not have a daily cap. Other ways to pay are via their app or in exact change. Their app offers the best rate for tickets.

### **TRAM**

The primary use of the tram is to get to and from the airport or outer neighborhoods like Leith. Besides that, you'll be better off walking or catching the bus!

Tickets can be purchased at tram vending machines at each tram station with exact change or credit card. You can also purchase tram tickets through the Lothian Buses app, keeping your tickets in one place more accessible. Learn more on the **Edinburgh Tram website.** 

# **TAXIS**

Like all major cities, taxis are abundant and will be pricier than a bus or tram ride. Taxis are metered; you should expect to pay less than £10 to get around the city and £30-40 to get to/from the airport. Flag down a cab or use an app like **FREENOW** to take taxis around Edinburgh.

Edinburgh has an incredible food scene, so you'll be hard-pressed to have a bad meal. We can't include every excellent recommendation, but you can rest assured that anything on this list will be satisfying!

# **OLD TOWN**

MAISON BLEUE: Serves up French, North African, and Scottish cuisine in a romantic, retro environment. (V, GF)

MAKAR'S MASH: Locals highly recommend Makar's Mash for its Scottish cuisine. Serves Lion's Mane Mushrooms grown in-house (V, GF)

**SCRAN BISTRO:** A great stop for breakfast with two locations in Old Town (no reservations needed) and one in New Town (which recommends reservations). (V)

**OINK:** A small chain specializing in pulled pork sandwiches. They have a serious fanbase and consistently deliver.

#### THE SCOTCH WHISKY EXPERIENCE:

Book the ever-popular whisky tasting with or without food pairings. They have a restaurant you can enjoy without going on a tour. (R, V)

WHISKI BAR & RESTAURANT: Whisky and classic Scottish dishes are on the menu at this highly-rated restaurant. With live music every night, the ambiance here is perfect, and you don't need a reservation. (V, GF)

**TIMBERYARD:** A family-owned Michelin Star British restaurant in an old 19th-century warehouse. (R, V)

**KANPAI SUSHI:** A Japanese restaurant near Edinburgh Castle. **(V)** 

TUPINIQUIM BRASIL CREPES: A crepe stand with character, known for their Green Police Box and delicious glutenfree sweet or savory crepes. (V, GF)

THE DEVIL'S ADVOCATE: Well-known and sometimes challenging to get into, the seasonal Scottish fare will be worth any trouble. (V, R)

**HOWIES:** Also serving seasonal Scottish Fare, this restaurant has a few locations to choose from and won't disappoint. BYOB is allowed with a corkage fee on weekdays. (R)

spot for classic fish & chips. It's always busy, but it's worth the wait! It is located on iconic Victoria Street off the Royal Mile. They even have vegan fish & chips and gluten-free options. Reservations are available but not necessary. (V, GF)

<u>CAFFE CENTRO:</u> A family-run Italian restaurant that's open for breakfast. (V, GF)

**FHIOR:** Recognized by Michelin Guide, this is upscale Scottish dining for which you'll want reservations! (V, GF, R)

THE VOODOO ROOMS: A stunning restaurant and bar with live music and an eclectic menu. (V, GF)

**DOWN THE HATCH:** Enjoy Canadian comfort food with great wings and burgers. Cashless (V)

**JOHNNIE WALKER:** The whisky experience of New Town Edinburgh. Book a tour or enjoy the rooftop bar. (R)

**BABA:** A Mediterranean cocktail bar that is excellent for groups with plates made for sharing. (V)

TILES BAR: Classic pub fare with a Scottish touch. It has a uniquely tiled interior and a great view from the outdoor seating. (V, GF)

**KA PAO**: Well-priced Asian cuisine with excellent staff and atmosphere. (V)

# **STOCKBRIDGE**

THE SCRAN AND SCALLIE: This Michelin Bib pub comes from a multi-Michelin Star chef! You can expect great food for great prices here. (V)

**THE PANTRY:** Open for breakfast, brunch, and lunch; the eggs benedict and avocado toast are the talk of the town. (V, GF)

**PATISSERIE FLORENTIN:** A cozy cafe that features the works of local artists.

**HECTOR'S:** An all-day pub serving up Scottish classics and plenty of pie! (V)

**NOK'S KITCHEN:** Nok's serves traditional Thai food in a romantic setting. **(V)**
